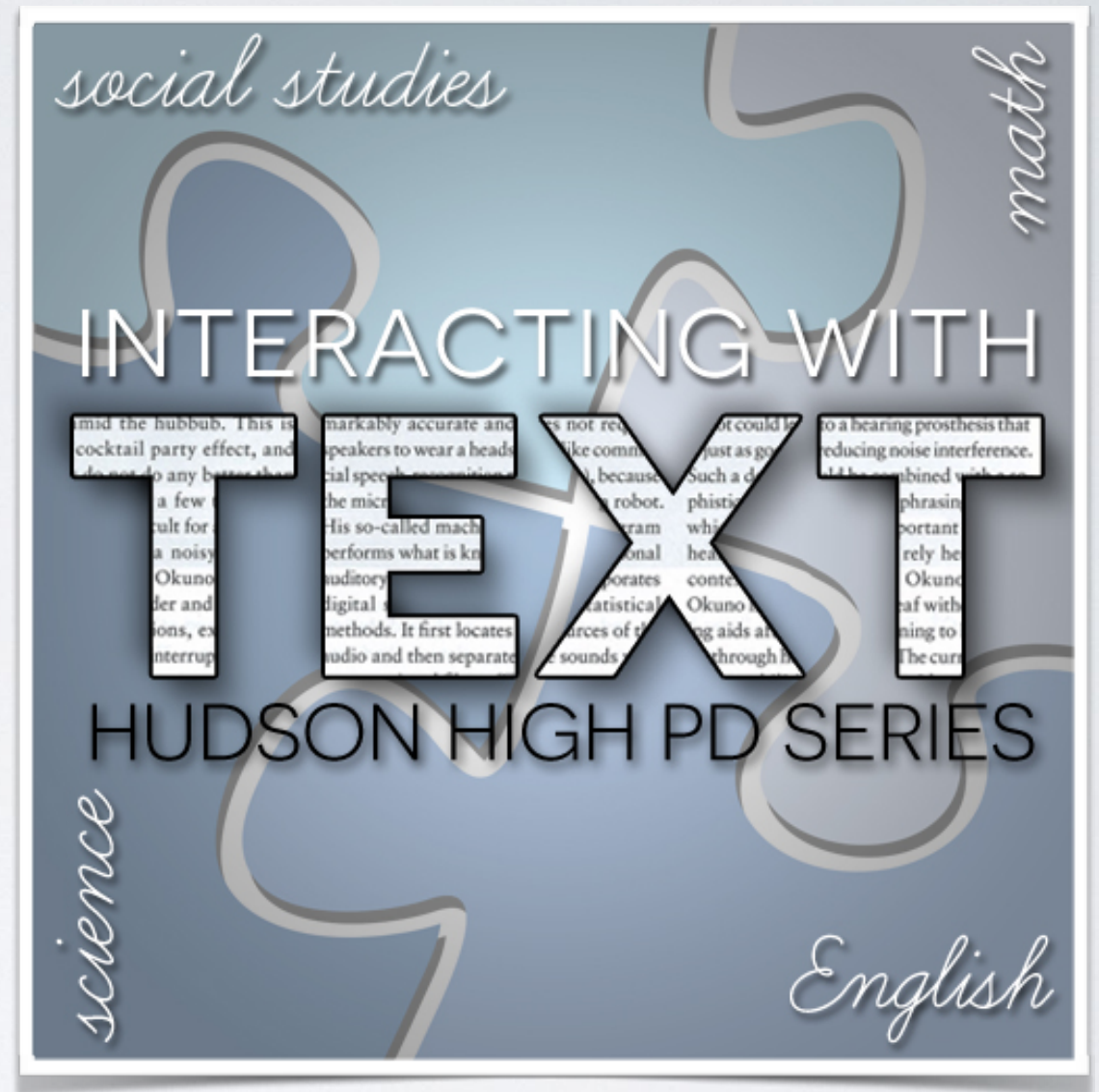
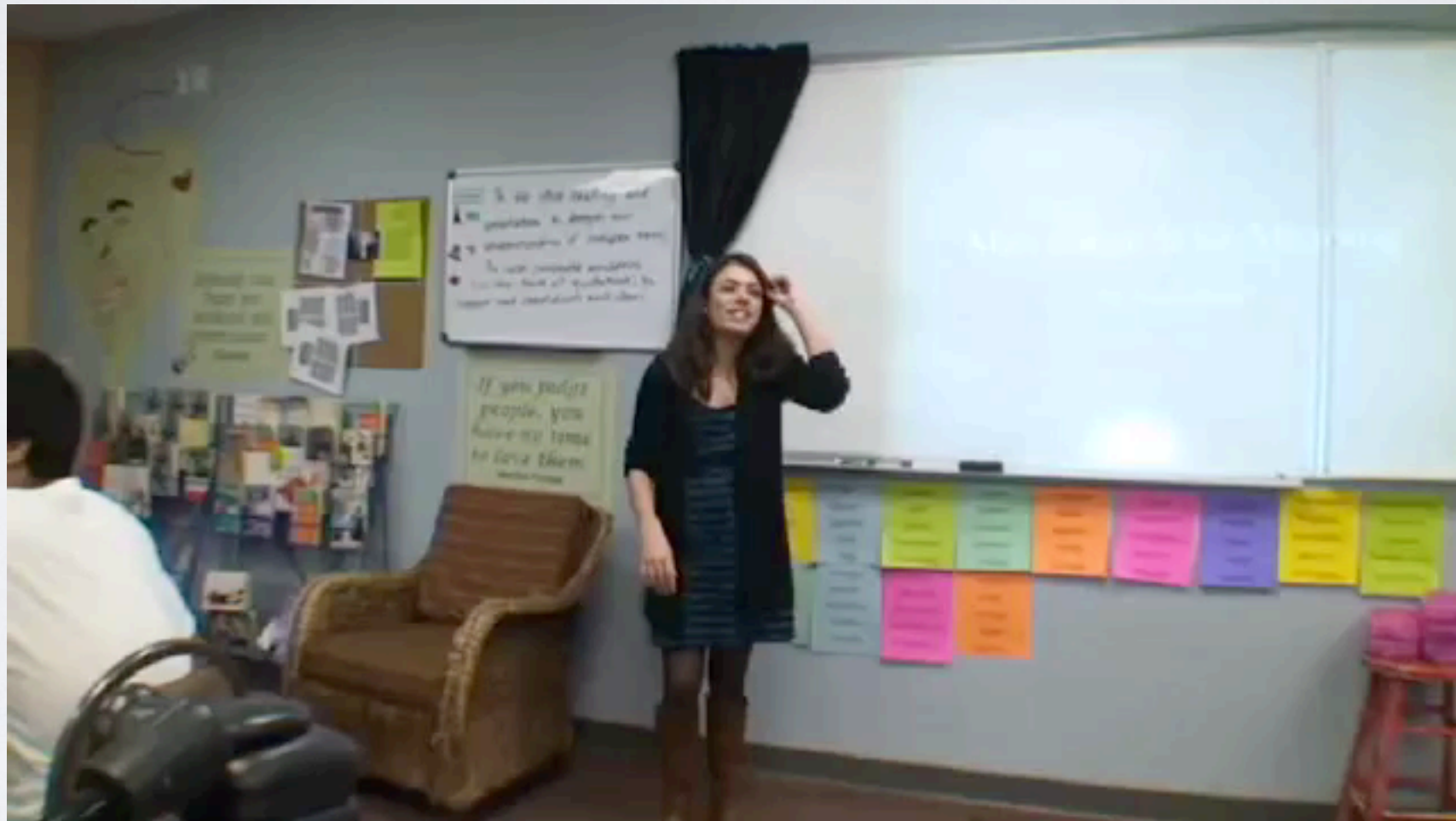

WHAT IS TEXT MARKING?



WHY MARK THE TEXT?

- Engagement
- Requires that students actually think about and understand what they're reading
- Students need to learn the text well in order to provide evidence and justification for answers later

WHAT SHOULD WE CLOSE READ?

- Complex texts
- Not “anemic” texts
- Grade level



HOW DO WE MARK TEXT?

- Formally
 - Highlighters
 - Metacognitive markers
- Informally
 - Notes in the margins

Word Choice: Words that suggest a deeper connotative meaning



Main ideas



Things you have questions about



Point of view or purpose: Identify moments where the author makes these clear



Main points of the argument

you must also write a comment!**

STEPS FOR IMPLEMENTING TEXT MARKING IN YOUR CLASSROOM TOMORROW

1. Select a complex text (use Pasco's digital databases, like Ebsco)
2. Select a purpose for reading
 - Answer an essential question? Connect to standard?
3. Gradual release
 - Model your thinking
 - Guided instruction (allow for students to contribute to the annotation)
 - Collaborative (allow students to work together on their annotations)
 - Independent
